ALGONQUIN GLOSSARY

Canonicus Narragansett sachem who pressured Massasoit Ousamequin after the epidemic of

1616-1619 to pay tribute with wampum in exchange for protection and assistance.

Cheepi God of the dead. A source of power for the pnieces and shamans. Both

Tisquantum and Hobomock's names have the same meaning as cheepi.

Epenow Aquinnah Sachem, one of many who agreed to the alliance agreement.

King Phillip Metacom/Pometacom/Metacomet was the second son of Ousamequin. He

became the sachem after the mysterious death of his brother Massasoit Wamsutta.

Metacom led the charge in the war named after him, dying in 1676.

Massasoit Great Chief/leader. Ousamequin Yellow Feather was the Great Chief of the

Pokanoket Wampanoag people.

Midden A trash mound mostly made up of muscle shells and non-shell material left by the

natives before the Mayflower arrival. They are over a thousand years old and have

spiritual meaning to the Natives.

Mishoon A long boat. Large tree trunk is burned on the top side to hollow out using Elk horn

or a large mammal's hip bone.

Nauset Present-day Eastham, Cape Cod, Massachusetts where the first sighting of the

Nauset Natives occurred at First Encounter Beach.

Noepe Martha's Vineyard, an island off the coast of Cape Cod Massachusetts.

Patuxet Location of the Wampanoag Pokanoket village wiped out by the epidemic and

where the Pilgrims settled.

Petroglyph Images chipped into rocks that only have meaning for the person who created it.

Pniece A spiritual leader, priest, counselor warrior.

Pokanoket The first people who inhabited villages in Southeastern Massachusetts Cape Cod,

Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket Islands, and the east side of Narragansett Bay.

Sachem Chief of a native village. Known as sagamore in the area known as Maine.

Sachemships are villages lead by a sachem.

Sowams The home of the Massasoit Ousamequin, a peninsula on the east side of

Narragansett Bay in Warren/Bristol Rhode Island.

Weir Net and wood fences in the water channeling varieties of fish for the catch.

Wetu A winter or summer house of the Pokanoket Wampanoag people.
